In 2023, Central Seminary's Board of Directors made the decision to relocate their campus headquarters to a right-sized campus space as part of "The Future is Central," three strategic initiatives created to lead the seminary into the future while continuing their commitment to delivering excellent theological education while also addressing the shifting ministry needs of our world.

Few programs at Central now require in-person learning, a trend that is common at seminaries across the country. All programs are offered either fully or partially online. Most students no longer live within drivable distance to our Shawnee, Kansas campus. They instead are scattered across the United States and around the world, and their preference is to learn virtually. Only international students living in the U.S. on a student visa and some doctoral students are required to be occasionally on campus.

President Pamela R. Durso finalized the sale of the Shawnee campus to a growing congregation in the Kansas City area that needed more land and additional space.

In late December, Central moved to their new location: 8620 W. 110th Street, Overland Park, Kansas. This new space of 9,000 square feet includes classrooms, a library, prayer and reflection space, faculty and staff offices, and other shared workspaces. It is the perfect space for a global seminary in the 21st century.

As part of this relocation, about 80% of Central's print book collection was digitized and added to the Digital Theological Library (DTL) for greater accessibility. All students, regardless of program and physical proximity to campus, will have access to Central's library collection plus the 1.5 million books and 61,000 journals already available through DTL. From the print collection that remained, Central shared just over 700 books with sister schools: the Cambodian Bible Institute and The Chin College.

Are You Following Through?

It's February, so I'm checking up on you. Did you make any New Year's resolutions this year? What do you want to change this year or do differently? So many people, in general, want to make big changes including:

- Exercising more to get healthy
- Eating less or better to lose weight
- Stop smoking
- Drinking more water
- Drinking less alcohol
- Giving up other addictions
- Growing closer to spouse / family
- Spending more time with God
- Spending more time in prayer
- Getting more involved in missions
- Make a budget /spend less money
- Volunteering more
- Giving more to missions & church
- Saving on taxes

The problem is that we may want to change so many things at once and then we make one mistake or have one bad day and we give up on our resolutions all together!! Generally speaking, New Year's resolutions do not work. Consider a few quotes below:

" The only thing harder than making a New Year's resolution is keeping it."

" The best way to make a New Year's resolution is to not make one at all."

(Sources are unknown for both.)

Now after sharing both of these quotations you may have a different opinion of me. You might think I may be a pessimist or a negative thinker, but that is definitely not true! However, I am a realist and I know how hard change is for myself, so I figure it's just as hard for anyone else to accomplish. Maybe instead of making New Year's resolutions, we should pray and think about changes we want to make in the new year and ask God to help us, and find others to encourage us in those endeavors. I am trying to do that as I want to make some changes for the better in my own life and ministry as well.

That list of resolutions that I made up earlier was just a standard list of many things that people want to change. Still, if you are interested in the last two items on the list, I can help you with that. If you wish to fund a charitable gift annuity in this new year, I can assist you in that way. The benefits of funding a charitable gift annuity are at least three fold or triune, in my opinion. If you want to fund a gift annuity with \$1,000, \$10,000 or even \$100,000, then you can receive those three benefits or blessings. Just to be clear you can give any amount you wish, but the minimum gift is \$1,000.

The first is that a portion of the gift comes back to you, if you list yourself as the beneficiary. You can also include your spouse in that as well, which is called a two-life annuity. Based on the amount of the gift and the age or ages of the beneficiaries, a certain percentage of this split interest gift comes back to you in a payment that you will receive till the end of your life.

The second benefit will help you accomplish your resolution to give more money to missions and the church because you can choose the mission partners that your remainder amount will help when the Lord calls you home. These mission partners can include your home church, another church, a variety of offerings and a myriad of mission partners including American Baptist institutions, our Home Mission Society, International Ministries and individual missionaries that serve around the globe through I M.

The third benefit will help you accomplish that last item on the resolution list, which is to save on taxes. You will receive an income tax deduction based on the amount given to fund the gift annuity that corresponds to the remainder amount given to the mission partners of your choice. This amount is calculated by our planned giving software. Also, if you have appreciated stock and wish to use that to fund a charitable gift annuity, not only will you receive an income tax deduction, but you will receive a capital gains tax deduction based upon the amount of stock that you are using to fund the annuity. So that could be a win-win situation for you as well!

I guess there is really a fourth benefit as well because you will receive the satisfaction, joy and good feeling of knowing that you have helped a variety of mission partners to care for others and announce the good news of God's Kingdom, Jesus' love and the Holy Spirit's presence to help many more people become a part of the family of God!

If you are interested in funding a charitable gift annuity, please get a hold of me by phone or email and I will be happy to help you fund your annuity and benefit others in the process. I pray that God's grace and strength will be upon you as you work on your resolutions or choose another way to make changes in your life!

CENTRAL SEMINARY RECEIVES GRANT TO ADDRESS CLIMATE CHANGE

Central Seminary has been selected to participate in the Climate Science in Theological Education (CSTE) Grant Initiative of the American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS) Dialogue on Science, Ethics, and Religion (DoSER) program.

This project will enable Central to build greater capacity to address climate change. Rev. Dr. Ruth Rosell, director of the Buttry Center for Peace and Nonviolence at Central, will direct the CSTE grant program. Programs and activities being explored through this grant include virtual and in-person events, conversations, and discussion aimed at equipping faith leaders and students for the emerging crisis of climate change.

"I'm grateful Central Seminary was chosen to receive this Climate Science in Theological Education grant," said Rev. Rosell. "It will contribute toward fulfilling our mission of preparing leaders to seek God, shape church, and serve humanity and all creation. It will do this by providing opportunities for students, faculty, staff, alumni, pastors, and people of faith to better understand and respond to the challenges of doing faithful ministry in our changing climate. It also connects us to other seminaries and those in the scientific community who are engaged in addressing the climate crisis."

The Climate Science in Theological Education initiative is a project of the AAAS DoSER program. The project provides grants to seminaries to engage climate science and climate change in the context of theological education and ministry. Integrating science into seminary education and events will encourage interest within seminaries and surrounding communities about the relevance of science to theological education and will produce a growing number of religious leaders equipped to help their congregants find answers to science-related questions.

The American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS) is the world's largest general scientific society and publisher of the Science family of journals. The nonprofit is open to all and fulfills its mission to "advance science and serve society" through initiatives in science policy, international programs, science education, public engagement, and more. Building upon its mission, AAAS established the Dialogue on Science, Ethics, and Religion (DoSER) program in 1995 to facilitate communication between scientific and religious communities. IDENTITY THROUGH THE LENS OF CHRIST

Over the last few weeks, the topic of identity has come up more than once. Last Sunday, when I was worshiping with FBC Horton, Pastor John Kress challenged us to think about who we are in Christ and what we are called to do if we claim our identity in him. Furthermore, earlier that week, I had another conversation with one of our pastors about how we identify ourselves primarily as a child of God before any other identifiers such as our profession, country of residence, school, place in our family, etc. (or even favorite football team. Go Chiefs!)

Youth ministry leaders and researchers talk a lot about how to help young people discover their identity and purpose. Authors and scholars from Fuller Youth Institute discovered in their research that young people are asking big questions about identity, purpose, and belonging. Parents, pastors, church leaders, and youth ministry leaders are encouraged to make space for young people to ask difficult questions in order to discover who they are in Christ.

Yet, this is not really a new idea. Blaise Pascal wrote in, "Not only do we not know God except through Jesus Christ; we do not even know ourselves except through Jesus Christ." Christ is the lens through which we view God and, in turn, ourselves.

If we first and foremost identify as followers of Christ and children of God, then we must ask ourselves important questions. What does that mean for how we should live? What should be our priorities? How shall we spend our time, talents, and resources? How should we identify ourselves to others?

The same would be true for how we view others. If we see God and ourselves through the lens of Christ, then we must also see others through that same lens. They are created and loved by God as well. They might not know Christ, but we do.

Young people are making important decisions about who they are, what God is calling them to, and where they belong. People in their teens and twenties are in a crucial time of discovery and growth. They need adults in their lives who live out their identities in Christ in real and visible ways. Yet, faith is a journey, not a destination. In some ways, we are all still trying to figure out who we are and what God wants for us.

In Psalms 139:14, we find David's words of praise, reminding us that the One who created everything created us. "I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made; your works are wonderful; I know that full well." We know full well that we are, first and foremost, God's children and followers of Christ. May we seek every day to live out that identity in Christ in all that we do and say so that the world and our children might see God and themselves through the lens of Christ.

Keynote Speaker

Dr. Kathy Maxwell has served as the Central Seminary Vice President of Academic Affairs and Dean of the Faculty since 2023, providing vision and leadership in directing and overseeing the work of all faculty and academic activities that are consistent with Central Seminary's mission, vision, unique value proposition, and all current and forthcoming strategic and culture plans.

Dr. Maxwell earned her Ph.D. in New Testament from Baylor University, Waco, Texas. Her dissertation, *Hearing Between the Lines*, explores the audience's active role in receiving and telling the story of Luke-Acts and was published in 2010 by T&T Clark. Her current research focuses on the audience's formation and participation in hearing the biblical story in ancient times and the modern world. She is particularly interested in biblical storytelling and certified through the Network of Biblical Storytellers. Dr. Maxwell is also a two-time graduate of Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene, Texas, where she earned a Master of Divinity degree from Logsdon School of Theology and a Bachelor of Arts in Church Ministry.

"I have worked to develop an empathetic leadership style, specifically valuing the art of listening, the questions driven by creativity and curiosity, and the hard work of seeking common ground. My interest in biblical storytelling has played a significant role in this regard. Through the process of internalizing scripture and the regular practice of placing myself in the "sandals" of biblical characters, I have become convinced that hospitality and reconciliation are at the core of the biblical story. Hospitality and reconciliation are impossible without cultivating empathy."
